Multi-phase project to upgrade schools

New learning spaces for science and technology. Long-needed updates to building infrastructure. Renovations to the greenhouse and agriculture wing.

Those are among the highlights of Phase 1 of Cobleskill-Richmondville Central School's proposed project: "Learn Forward: A Multiphase Campus Modernization Plan."

District residents will vote Wednesday, Feb. 3, on the \$14.1 million first phase, which includes upgrades and improvements to all four school buildings. If approved, some of the work could begin by summer of 2022.

Because as much as 82.5 percent of the project's costs will be covered by state building aid and because the project would begin at a time the district is retiring some debt service (principal and interest payments), approval of Phase 1 is **not expected**

Approval of Phase 1 is not expected to raise the tax levy.

to raise the local property tax levy.

Voters can cast their ballots either in person or by absentee ballot. Polls will be open at Cobleskill-Richmondville High School between 9 a.m. and 9 p.m., and absentee ballots can be requested by contacting the district office at 518-234-4032.

The modernization project, which has been in planning stages for more than five years, has been separated into three distinct phases. Voters will consider the second and third phases of the project in 2022 and 2024, respectively.

Phase 1 Scope of work

The first phase addresses infrastructure needs at each C-R school. Additional information about the work is outlined below:



GEORGE D. RYDER ELEMENTARY SCHOOL

Building age: 63 years **Phase 1 cost:** \$3.8 million **Projected work:**

- Creation of "Maker Space" for hands-on STEM learning
- Drop-off/pick-up loop redesign
- Main office/security vestibule improvements
- Improvements to playgrounds

Building age: 89 years **Phase 1 cost:** \$3.5 million **Projected work:**

- Creation of "Maker Space" for hands-on technology learning
- Relocation of main office for enhanced security
- Drop-off/pick-up loop redesign
- Renovation of nurses' and guidance offices

A multi-phase approach

Initially, the district had been planning for a larger, single project. But given the financial uncertainty caused by the pandemic, the plan was restructured into smaller projects spread out over a five-year period. This approach minimizes the impact on the tax levy. Because as much as 82.5 percent of costs could be recovered through state aid and because the district will be paying down older debt over the next few years, approval of the project will not require an increase to the local property tax levy above its current level.

"Given the high degree of economic uncertainty caused by the pandemic, we believe separating this project into smaller phases helps us maintain flexibility and minimize the impact on taxpayers," said Carl J. Mummenthey, C-R's Superintendent of Schools. "Because we are retiring some other debt in the coming years, we can complete this work without any additional burden on our district's taxpayers.

"The average age of our schools is 66-years-old, and some of our infrastructure, including heating and cooling systems, already have surpassed their expected useful lives," he added. "By proposing to voters that we invest in our infrastructure now, we hope to avoid even more costly repairs in the future -- or, worse, a total system failure."

The most urgently needed work has been included in the first phase of the project. Some of that work includes: replacement of heating and cooling systems, some of which have exceeded their life expectancies; security enhancements to school entrances; and improvements to the parent drop-off/pick-up circles for better efficiency and safety

Other parts of Phase 1 will more directly affect student learning, including the construction of "Maker Spaces" at both Radez and Ryder

elementary schools. In those modern classrooms, students will gain hands-on experience in science, technology and engineering.

Additionally, improvements are planned for the agriculture education areas of Cobleskill-Richmondville High School, including a full renovation of the greenhouse.

"The improvements to these learning spaces would help us maintain a rich, rigorous curriculum for our students, especially in the areas of agriculture, science and technology," Mummenthey said. "We submit this proposal to voters asking that we may complete necessary upgrades to our physical spaces and enhance learning opportunities for students in these emerging fields."

How to vote

The Capital Project vote will take place in-person on **Wednesday, Feb. 3**, from 9 a.m. to 9 p.m. at C-R High School's "Hall of Flags."

What's on the ballot? 2021 Capital Project Phase 1 Proposition

District residents will vote "yes or no" on the following resolution:

RESOLVED, that (a) the Board of Education (the "Board") of the Cobleskill-Richmondville Central School District, Schoharie, Montgomery and Otsego Counties, New York (the "District"), is hereby authorized to undertake a capital improvement project (the "Project") consisting of the reconstruction and renovation of, and the construction of improvements and upgrades to, various District buildings and facilities (and the sites thereof), to implement various health, safety, accessibility, and code compliance measures required by the State Education Department in connection with any significant capital improvement project, and to undertake various other measures as described in greater detail in (but not to be limited by) the Project Plan that was referred to in the public notice of the vote on this Proposition, and to expend therefor an amount not to exceed \$14,100,000; (b) a tax is hereby voted in an amount not to exceed \$14,100,000 to finance the balance of the estimated maximum cost of the Project, such tax to be levied and collected in installments in such years and in such amounts as shall be determined by the Board; (c) in anticipation of such tax, obligations of the District are hereby authorized to be issued in an aggregate principal amount of not to exceed \$14,100,000, and a tax is hereby voted to pay the interest on such obligations as the same shall become due and payable; and (d) New York State Building Aid funds expected to be received by the District are anticipated to offset a substantial part of such costs, and such funds, to the extent received, shall be applied to offset and reduce the amount of taxes herein authorized to be levied.
